In November, we remember in a special way our brother knights who have died. Even though this is only once a year, we have a wonderful opportunity to pray for them, pray for our own needs and pray for the needs of others all year long. This opportunity is – the Rosary!

From time to time, I have had the opportunity to bless rosaries for our members and their families as well as for our brothers and sisters in Christ. These rosaries, not only invite us to invoke the patroness of our Order and to pray for one another in a spirit of charity, unity and fraternity but to pray for all of God's children. The rosary helps us enter more deeply into the central mysteries of our faith that we celebrate in the liturgy throughout the year.

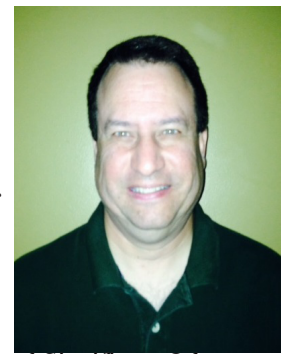
In many of these mysteries that we contemplate as we pray each decade of the rosary, the Blessed Virgin Mary has played a visible role. In others, Mary is perhaps less visible but no less present. But in each case, Mary leads us to Jesus. In other words, the rosary is a prayer centered on Jesus: It is seeing Christ through the eyes of Mary and entering into her memory, where the events of Jesus' life were kept and understood like nowhere else.

In the rosary, we call upon Mary to help us meditate on the mysteries and events in salvation history that has given us new life in Christ.

**History 2018**  
**1934**

FDR gave recognition to the Cuban government granting complete independence, but retaining the rights to Guantanamo Bay along with an arms embargo.

There was a whole lotta' labor unrest in 1934. There were striking dock workers in San Francisco, truck drivers in Minneapolis, textile workers nationwide and a strike at the Electric Auto-Lite Company in Toledo, Ohio.

A test for your memory: how many of you can remember the Catholic League of Decency, founded to rate movies for Catholic audiences? My parents relied heavily on those ratings. We weren't allowed to see any movies that didn't get the top rating, obviously preventing me from becoming worse than I am.

There were a couple of notable births that affected the sports world years later: Bart Starr (Jan. 9<sup>th</sup>), the QB for those dreaded Packers, or cheese heads if you will. (Although, before the Vikings, the Packers and the Baltimore Colts with Johnny Unitas were my favorite teams); and Hank Aaron (Feb. 5<sup>th</sup>), the home run king.

The crime world was big news in 1934. John Dillinger used a machine gun to escape from the police right here in Minneapolis when they thought they had him surrounded on March 31<sup>st</sup>. He was wanted in several states for bank robbery and murder. He avoided capture again in St. Paul on April 23<sup>rd</sup>, leaving behind two dead and five wounded. The feds finally put an end to him in Chicago on July 22<sup>nd</sup> while exiting a movie theater. Another bank robbing duo, Bonnie and Clyde, died in a hail of gunfire in a police ambush on May 23<sup>rd</sup>. Bank robber, Charles 'Pretty Boy' Floyd, was killed by federal agents at a farm in Ohio on October 22<sup>nd</sup>. And, finally, George 'Baby Face' Nelson, another notorious gangster, attempted to avenge the killing of his buddies by getting in a shootout with federal agents in Illinois. He killed two but was badly wounded himself and his body was found later in a ditch outside of Chicago.

What a year! Well, I'm outta' here, 'cuz my time is up. See ya' next month!

**Milwaukee Brats**

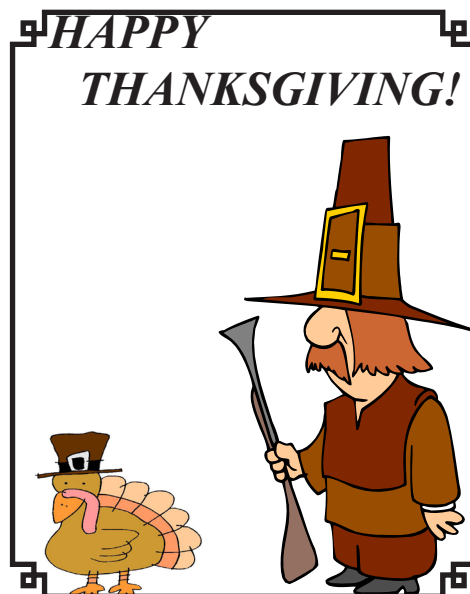
10-12 Johnsonville Bratwurst, grilled (please do not boil your brats!)

In a roaster oven, or larger crockpot, place grilled brats on the bottom. Add the following:

- 1 large onion, julienned
- 1-2 green peppers, julienned
- 1 bag of Franks Sauerkraut (Cub Foods)

1 bottle beer, your choice, but I would use MGD, Michelob or similar  
1 stick of butter

Slow cook for about 3 hours (325 degrees in roaster oven), 4 hours in a crockpot. Stir carefully, occasionally, avoid breaking the bratwurst. Use bratwurst buns, which are sturdier than typical hotdog buns. Enjoy!
